Faculty Senate Minutes

April 16, 1980

I. Regular Meeting

III. Approval of the Agenda and Report of the Steering Committee

- Mr. Jim Pitts moved the adoption of the agenda. The motion was seconded and adopted.
- 2. Report of the Steering Committee

Mr. Jim Pitts reported (1) that the University-wide Advisory Committee to the Undergraduate Policy Committee on Liberal Studies authorized by the Faculty Senate on March 12, 1980 was appointed by the Steering Committee. V. Liberal Studies

Mr. Edward Mellon, on behalf of the Undergraduate Policy Committee, reported that the Committee had received so many recommendations that the Committee did not have time to prepare a statement for action at this meeting of the Faculty Senate.

Mr. Jim Pitts presented and moved adoption of the following:

That area committees as well as any interested departments and faculty be asked to provide a statement of rationale for the inclusion of courses within their area concerning the Liberal Studies requirement and/or a statement of philosophy for the entire Liberal Studies requirement. This information should be received by the Undergraduate Policy Committee by April 30 in order that the Undergraduate Policy Committee be able to bring a statement to the Senate at its May 28 meeting.

The motion was seconded.

Mr. Eugene Kaelin moved to consider the motion in two parts. The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mr. Kaelin moved adoption of the first sentence. The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mr. Eugene Kaelin moved adoption of the second sentence. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Fred Standley moved to amend the motion by changing April 30 to May 7, 1980. The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mr. Charles Rockwood moved to substitute the following for the motion as amended: This information should be received by the Undergraduate Policy Committee by May 31, 1980 and delete the words "in order that the Undergraduate Policy Committee be able to bring a statement to the Senate at its May 28 meeting." The motion was seconded and adopted.

Mr. Steve Rollin moved that the Undergraduate Policy Committee bring a statement on Liberal Studies to the first regular Senate meeting in the Fall quarter. The Motion was seconded.

Mr. Fred Standley made a substitute motion that recommendations on Liberal Studies should be brought to a special session of the Senate no later than July 30, 1980. The motion was seconded and defeated.

Mr. Rollin's motion was adopted.

Mr. Fred Standley moved that the Undergraduate Policy Committee circulate to the faculty its recommendations one month prior to the first Senate meeting in the 1980 Fall quarter. The motion was seconded and adopted.

VI. Report on the Progress of the Steering Committee Working on Semester Conversion

Dr. Daisy Flory, Dean of the Faculties and Chairperson for the Committee, reported that the Committee had agreed on the following recommendations:

- 1. Fall (first) term (which would begin sometime between August 24 and 31) should consist of 15 weeks of instruction plus one week of examinations (with four holidays during the term). (It appears that the Board of Regents has agreed that the exact beginning date is to be the prerogative of each university in the system.)
- 2. Spring (second) term (which would begin between January 3 and 10) should consist of 15 weeks of instruction plus one week of examinations (with a spring break.)
- 3. The Summer term of 1981 should consist of one 8-week term. (The Committee cannot make recommendations about the model of the summer term after conversion to semester plan until other decisions are made by the Board of Regents.)
- 4. The basic class pattern should be 50-minutes classes, meeting three times a week. (The pattern for the Tuesday and Thursday classes is still in discussion.)
- 5. In converting quarter hour courses to the semester, departments, schools, and colleges should be advised to reduce credit hours by approximately one-third and where possible to reduce titles by one-third.
- 6. No laboratory should meet less than once each week; Saturday and night labs should not be ruled out. Departments with laboratory courses should coordinate their scheduling with other departments with laboratory courses.

Dr. Flory reminded the Senate that all of the recommendations above are subject to change by actions of the Cabinet Board of Education, the Commissioner of Education, and the Board of Regents.

The Faculty Senate Steering Committee has made the decision to direct the University Curriculum Committee to grant provisional approval for all courses that meet the guidelines for conversion established by the University. All courses so approved will be under continuing evaluation. Special attention is to be given to anomalies. Schools and departments are advised to have their course conversions ready for the Curriculum Committee by the first of the year, 1981, at the latest.

Dr. Flory reported also that the SUS Council of Academic Vice Presidents has approved a recommendation that the summer term attendance requirement for students be changed from 15 hours under the quarter system to 9 hours under the semester system.

VII. Announcements of the President

President Bernard Sliger made the following announcements:

- 1. Letters have been sent to the Deans listing those who have been approved for promotion and those who have been recommended to the Board of Regents for tenure. The final notification of tenure cannot be made until after the May meeting of the Board of Regents.
- 2. President Sliger is a member of the search committee for a Chancellor. If anyone has any recommendations, he asks that they be forwarded to him in writing.
- 3. President Sliger requested that anyone who hears or reads of anything happening in the Legislature that he should be aware of, please bring it to his attention (preferably in writing).
