I. Regular Session

The regular session of the Faculty Senate met on Wednesday, December 6, 1995, in Dodd Hall Auditorium. Senate President Marilyn Young presided.

The minutes of November 8, 1995, were approved as distributed.

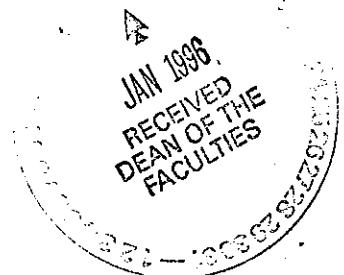
III. Approval of the Agenda

The agenda was approved as distributed.

IV. Report of the Steering Committee, M. Cowart

Since the last meeting of the Senate, the Steering Committee has met regularly. Attending sessions of the Steering Committee during this month were President D'Alemberte and, Jeff Robison, President of the FSU Foundation, on matters of faculty involvement in the Capital Campaign; Elisabeth Muhlenfeld, Undergraduate Dean, regarding issues of Academic Support of Athletes; and a joint meeting with Dean Muhlenfeld, Donald Foss, Dean of Arts and Sciences, Bruce Bickley, Director of Honors Program, and George Weaver, Director of the proposed Resident College, to discuss the concept of establishing a Residential College in Bryan Hall starting Fall 1997. A report by Professor Weaver describing the concept of the Residential College has been received by the Steering Committee.

Last week, the Steering Committee met in its regularly scheduled monthly meeting with President Sandy D'Alemberte. Our discussion with President D'Alemberte centered on events in the news concerning the organization and relationship of the individual universities and the Board of Regents stimulated by Representative Turnbull's proposal to establish individual Boards of Trustees at each University. In addition, we discussed the untimely cessation of the University Distinguished lecture Series, the reporting arrangements of academic support system for athletics, and faculty participation at university events such as graduation. You will hear more about the last item later in today's meeting.



Senate President Marilyn Young attended the November meeting of the Board of Regents held in Gainesville. She also participated in the quarterly meeting of the SUS Senate Presidents Advisory Council in December.

Following the last meeting of the Senate, Provost Abele requested that the Steering Committee submit names of faculty to serve on a committee to provide input on implementation of Schedule 25. Names were submitted and the committee was activated by holding one meeting to date to discuss procedures of summer and fall classroom scheduling.

The Steering Committee also suggested the names of faculty to serve on an Ad Hoc Committee to suggest ways to promulgate advising related to elective clusters to Undergraduate Dean Muhlenfeld.

The Steering Committee received a request from the Honors Program to provide flexibility in honors liberal studies requirements. The report was forwarded to the Undergraduate Policy Committee.

This concludes the report of the Steering Committee.

V. Reports of Standing Committees

a. University Curriculum Committee, K. Anderson-Lazier

Chairman Anderson-Lazier reported that the Curriculum Committee is willing to meet as often as necessary to meet catalog deadlines and implement changes to the curriculum described in SB 2330.

VI. Unfinished Business

There were no items of unfinished business for today's meeting.

VII. New Business

Senate President Young brought to the floor of the Senate, for discussion, the issue of faculty attendance at commencement ceremonies. There were several reasons given for the lack of faculty attendance at commencement, such as, grading final exams, lack of regalia and length of the ceremonies. President Young reminded Senators that they are the leaders for the faculty and she hoped that every effort would be made for them to attend the commencement ceremonies.

VIII. University Welfare

Janet Pumo, of the IBM consultant Group, gave a report of the recent survey concerning computer use on campus. She thought the responses to the survey had been very good.

Bruce Bickley distributed a checklist of faculty advisors and application deadlines for national and international scholarships and fellowships (addendum 1)

IX. Announcements of Deans and other administrative officers

a. **Provost Abele was not available for today's meeting.**

b. **J. Pitts, London Study Program**

Professor Pitts gave a brief description of the proposed curricular format for the London Study Program. It is hoped that these course offerings will enhance the program, not only for FSU students attending the London program, but also encourage the attendance of European students. The proposed course offerings are shown in addendum 2.

c. **J. Robison, FSU Foundation, Capital Campaign**



**NATIONAL and INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS and FELLOWSHIPS
A Checklist of Faculty Advisors and Application Deadlines**

Applicants for these fellowship programs must have superior academic credentials; typically, 3.8 or higher grade point averages; vigorously strong letters of support from faculty and other appropriate sponsors; excellent research, teaching, or public service experience; and well-focused future goals that the applicant can summarize articulately in writing and in live interviews. Students who plan to be serious applicants for any of these programs must see the appropriate advisor well in advance of the actual application deadlines.

Fulbright Grants: Normally awarded to seniors to support one year of clearly identified graduate research in a specific foreign country the year after graduation. Inquire in spring of junior year, apply in September of senior year. **Dr. David Darst, Modern Languages (644-8185).**

Goldwater Scholarships: Junior-year and senior-year scholarships for students committed to careers in research in the sciences or mathematics. Inquire in early fall of sophomore or junior year, apply in mid-November of that year. **Dr. Paul Elliott, Biological Science (644-6507).**

Marshall Scholarships: Supports two years of graduate study or a second undergraduate degree at British universities. Students seeking professional degrees (in law or medicine, for example) are not eligible. Inquire in spring of junior year, apply in early September of senior year. Graduate students may also apply. **Dr. DeWitt Sumners, Mathematics (644-4406).**

Mellon Fellowships: One-year fellowships to support the master's degree for students committed to teaching and research careers in American Studies, art history, classics, comparative literature, cultural anthropology, English literature, foreign languages and literature, history, history and philosophy of science, musicology, philosophy, political philosophy, and religion. Inquire by mid-October of senior year, send for application by first week in November. **Dr. Bruce Bickley, Honors Program (644-8360; 644-1841).**

Rhodes Scholarships: Two-year scholarships for study leading to the B. Litt. or Master's degree at Oxford in arts and sciences, engineering, social sciences, musicology, or history and philosophy of law. Applicants must have a history of competing in team or individual sports. Inquire in spring or summer of junior year, apply by mid-October of senior year. **Dr. Kenneth Goldsby, Chemistry (644-3204).**

Rotary Scholarships: Year-long scholarships to support overseas undergraduate or graduate study and good-will ambassadorial service. Students must have completed a minimum of two years of college. Inquire 24 months in advance. **Dr. Bill Long, Meteorology (644-6205; 385-3942).**

Truman Scholarships: Scholarships to help support the senior year and two years of Master's study for students committed to careers in public service. Students are typically majors in international relations, political science, or history. Inquire in spring or summer of sophomore year and apply by mid-November of junior year. **Dr. Charles Billings, Political Science (644-7322).**

Morris K. Udall Scholarships: One-year scholarships for rising juniors or seniors committed to careers in environmental public policy or for Native Americans or Alaska Native undergraduates intending careers in health care of tribal public policy. Inquire in fall of sophomore or junior year, apply in spring of that year. **Dr. Mary Ruckelshaus, Biological Science (644-4521).**

Washington Center Scholarships: One-semester and shorter-term seminar scholarships for undergraduates interested in careers in public service; must be at least a second-semester sophomore to participate in the Internships and other Washington placements offered by the Center. Various application dates for various Center programs. **Dr. James Ray, Political Science (644-6924).** FSU Honors students may be eligible for additional scholarship support; Honors students should see **Dr. Ray** first, then **Dr. Bruce Bickley, Honors Program (644-8360; 644-1841).**

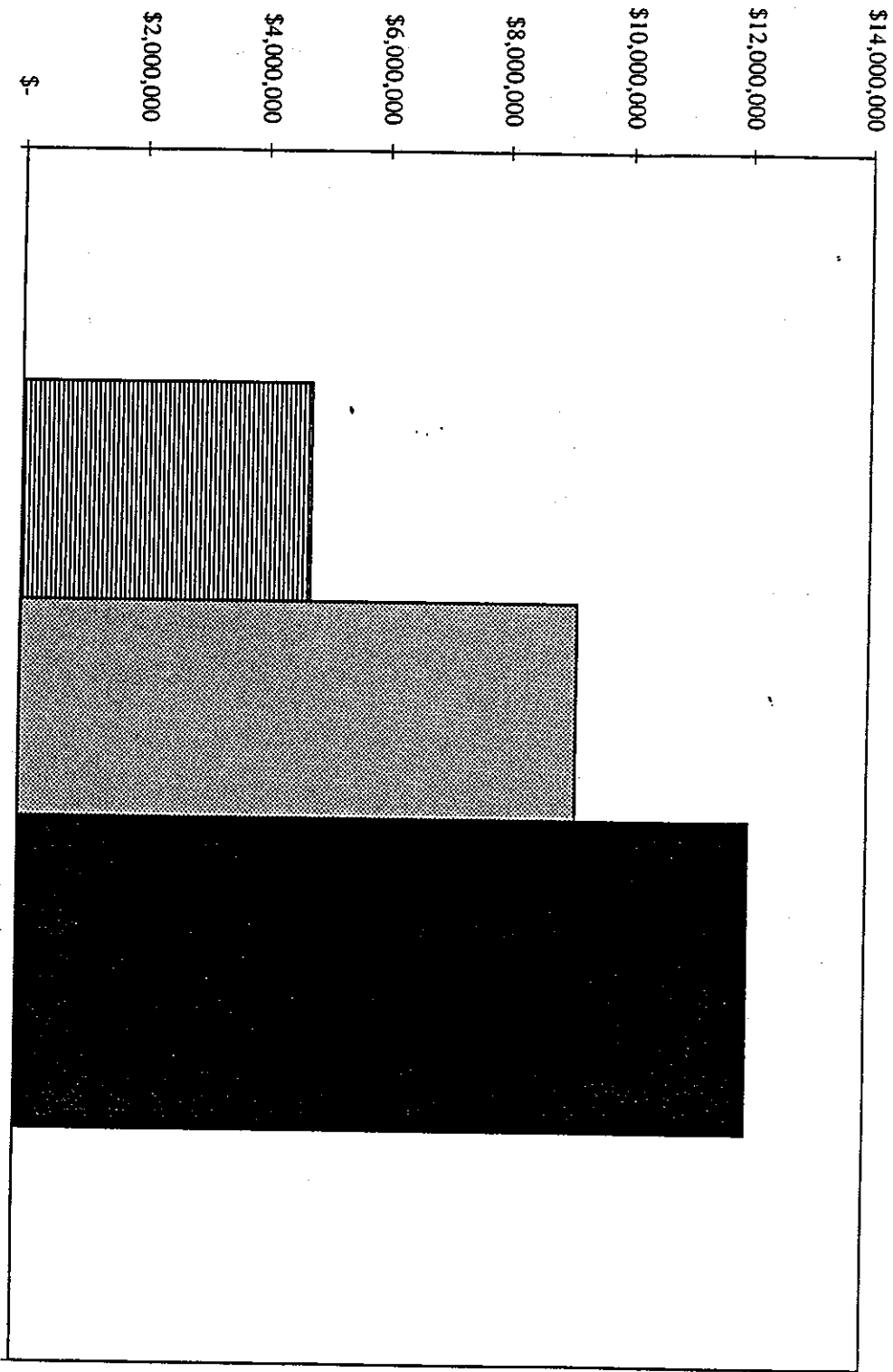
