#### FACULTY SENATE MEETING March 19, 1997 Dodd Hall Auditorium



#### I. Regular Session

The regular session of the 1996-1997 Faculty Senate met on Wednesday, March 19, 1997 at 3:45 p.m. Senate President Cowart presided.

## II. Approval of the Minutes

The minutes of February 19, 1997 were approved as distributed with the following change made on page two, number eight, line four of the Steering Committee Report. It should read "The School of Library and Information Studies should be changed to the School of Information Studies."

# III. Approval of the Agenda

The agenda was approved as distributed.

# IV. Report of the Steering Committee, J. Macmillan

Since the February 19 meeting of the Senate, the Steering Committee has met three times; we met with President D'Alemberte, Provost Abele, and Councilor Alan Sundberg on February 24 and with Dean Alan Mabe on March 17; President Cowart attended the Board of Regents Meeting in Tallahassee on March 14 and 15.

The following issues have been discussed:

- 1. With the President and Provost, we discussed the FSU legislative program. Provost Abele may report on this later in the meeting.
- 2. We also discussed questions having to do with the mix of students at FSU in future years. The tenuousness of affirmative action admissions policies is a feature in all such discussions; we are jointly concerned that an adequate policy-making board be up on this area and others having to do with "enrollment management."

- 3. We have received the report of the ad hoc committee on Sustained Performance Evaluation procedures. That report will be presented at the April meeting of the Senate.
- 4. With Dean Mabe we discussed the standards for teaching assistants that will come before the Senate today in a recommendation from the GPC; we also discussed the financing of tuition waivers for graduate students.

#### V. Reports of Standing Committees

#### a. Elections Committee, V. Richard

Professor Richard opened the floor for additional nominations to the University Committee on Faculty Sabbaticals. Senators were reminded that only tenured faculty may make nominations. The list of nominations received by mail ballot is attached as addendum 1. The following names were nominated and seconded by the floor:

Professor Richard opened the floor for additional nominations to the Grievance and Professional Relations and Welfare Committees. Senators were reminded that only tenured faculty may make nominations. There were no additional nominations. The list of nominations received by mail ballot is attached as addendum 2. Ballots for voting on these committees will be mailed out in the coming weeks.

## b. Graduate Policy Committee, L. Goldsmith for Jayne Standley

Professor Goldsmith presented the following two motions to the Senate for approval:

1) The College of Law may use its own grading system for the official grades and transcripts of law students.

Rationale: Currently, the College of Law uses a 60-100 grading scale which is compatible with other Law schools. These grades are then converted to the University 4.0 plus/minus grading scale for the student's official transcript, a system which is basically incompatible with theirs. This produces inconsistencies in reported grades and GPA's, especially inconsistencies with the reporting of other Law Schools. The Law School and the Dean of the Faculties office affirm that Max Carraway is supportive of this change and reports that his systems are capable of recording grades according to the Law School system.

The motion was adopted by the Faculty Senate.

2) Approval of the University-wide standards for teaching assistants at Florida State University. (The proposal is attached as Addendum 3.)

The floor was opened for discussion. Dr. Alan Mabe, Dean of Graduate Studies, was present to address comments and/or questions.

Senator Charles Billing proposed the following amendment to the motion:

On page two under the heading Equivalent Previous Experience and Emergencies the following should read: "Individual students who through previous preparation or teaching experience have demonstrated knowledge and strong teaching skills, can be exempt from some of the requirements in 2-7, as appropriate, by certification of the program chair."

The amendment was adopted by the Faculty Senate.

The motion as amended was adopted by the Faculty Senate.

#### VI. Unfinished Business

There were no items of unfinished business.

#### VII. New Business

The following motion was brought to the floor by Senator Beckham and was seconded by Marilyn Young:

To establish a Senate Committee that would review the evaluation procedures of PEP candidates for the upcoming year.

The floor was then opened for discussion. Dean Edwards reminded the Senate that a University PEP Committee was already in existence to address this matter. The PEP process tracts the tenure and promotion process. The committee members are attached as Addendum 4. The University PEP Committee, according to Dean Edwards, expects to have a list of new procedures in the Fall that will come before the Senate in September of 1997 for clarification and review.

The motion was withdrawn by Senator Beckham and Marilyn Young.

#### VIII. University Welfare

There were no items of University Welfare for today's meeting.

#### IX. Announcements of Deans and other administrative officers

Provost Abele answered questions from the floor pertaining to the University PEP process. He also discussed the legislative agenda and listed FSU's top four priorities. They are: 1) Salary adjustments, 2) To take care of old business, specifically the Appleton Museum, 3) To address the issue of waivers, and 4) The technology fee and tuition increase.

#### X. Announcements of the President of the University

President D'Alemberte discussed advances and allocation of funds in higher education and stated that it is a high priority with the state legislature. He also discussed the new administrative appointments with Sandra Rackley appointed as Dean of Undergraduate Studies and Councilor Alan Sundberg as the new General Counsel.

The President also added that FSU's 200 Million Dollar Campaign was increased to 250 million and that already 236 million had been raised. He also stated that the endowment has now surpassed the 100 Million Dollar mark. The President then proceeded to answer questions from the floor and remind everyone that FSU's 50th Anniversary celebration, "Ten Days of Gold", will take place April 4-13.

#### XI. Adjournment

The meeting adjourned at 5:00 p.m.

# University-wide Standards for Teaching Assistants at Florida State University

These are University-wide standards that any student would meet prior to assuming one of the various instructional roles. Departments may have additional standards, or may arrange to have a different way for the student to meet the University-wide standards.

These are meant to be university-wide minimum standards; departments may adopt additional or more stringent standards.

Graduate Programs which do not use graduate students in instructional roles would not be affected by these standards. They are meant to cover the formal use of teaching assistants in course instruction. Extra help sessions and voluntary tutorials in addition to regular class meetings would not normally fall under these requirements.

# Proposed University-wide Standards for Teaching Assistants

General: Each program would have a discipline-specific teaching manual for its teaching assistants which would supplement the university teaching manual.

# Requirements for Different Levels of Instruction:

- 1. Grader
  - -a program specific statement of standards for graders
- 2. Recitation/discussion section
  - -undergraduate degree in discipline or related field
  - -some graduate work completed or enrolled for
  - -PIE program (beginning of term sessions) or departmental equivalent
  - -faculty supervision
- 3. Lab section
  - -major in the discipline
  - -specific instruction in laboratory demonstration
  - -PIE program or departmental equivalent orientation
  - -supervision by senior lab assistant /or faculty

Course level types 4-7 presume the teaching assistant is providing the primary instruction in the course.

- 4. Lower-level course
  - -18 hours of graduate work in teaching discipline
  - -PIE program (beginning of term sessions and some workshops) or departmental equivalent -student participation in a "teaching in the discipline" course or equivalent departmental orientation
  - -faculty supervision

#### 5. Liberal studies course

-18 hours of graduate work in teaching discipline

- -PIE program (beginning of term sessions and some workshops) or departmental equivalent -student participation in a "teaching in the discipline" course or equivalent departmental orientation
- -faculty supervision
- 6. Upper-level non-major non-liberal studies course

-Master's degree or equivalent

- --PIE program (beginning of term sessions and some workshops) or departmental equivalent -student participation in a "teaching in the discipline" course or equivalent departmental orientation
- -faculty supervision

#### 7. Upper-level major course

-Master's degree or equivalent

- -enrolled in doctoral level course work and strongly encouraged to have completed two semesters of doctoral level course work
- -PIE program (beginning of term sessions and some workshops) or departmental equivalent -student participation in a "teaching in the discipline" course or equivalent departmental orientation
- -faculty supervision available

#### Requirement for all graduate students providing instruction of types 2-7:

All potential teaching assistants must meet the BOR and University requirements for spoken English language competence as detailed in 7.8.1 and 7.8.2 in the *Faculty Handbook*, 1991. (pp. 109-110)

#### Equivalent Previous Experience and Emergencies.

With the exception of the 18-hours-in-the-discipline rule for primary instruction which is mandated by the Commission on Colleges (SACS), the following options will be available to deal with special circumstances:

Individual students who through previous preparation or teaching experience have demonstrated knowledge and strong teaching skills, can be exempt from some of the requirements in 2-7, as appropriate, by certification of the program chair.

In an emergency a department may appoint a graduate teaching assistant who has not met all the University-wide requirements for that level of appointment if there is an assurance that the student will meet the requirements by the end of the term in which the student is teaching.
